

Newsletter Issue 1 15.06.16

This is the first in a series of informative newsletters to keep you up to date and prepare you for this unique adventure. Before the tour begins, a multi-page booklet will be printed with everything you need, and perhaps things you don't need. It will be distributed free to all participants, and will form the basis of a little booklet you can keep as a souvenir. After the run is over, pictures and a report on the tour will be added to the booklet which will become part of the Club's archive

The booklet will include background information on racing at Watkins Glen; a day by day itinerary; highly detailed maps; turn by turn directions; restaurant menus; information on museums; a list of participants and their cars and other things that will be added as things evolve or come to mind.

This issue deals mostly with the things you need to know or do before we embark on this adventure, and includes the list of participants as it now stands. It also includes some basics

- Your car and its equipment. Because the event in Watkins Glen celebrates Mazda, specifically sporting Mazdas, this TMC tour was open to RX7 and RX8s. Only Miatas have been entered and at this time the tour is closed with a standby that we are hoping will join us. We would like the cars participating in the Tour de Marque be identified as Trillium cars, so we need to have our antenna flags deployed. If you haven't got a Trillium flag, please let me know. The other thing that is important is that you have a working CB. If you don't have a CB installed, let me know. You and your partner need a passport.
- Tour dates: The tour starts on Thursday September 10 because events at the Watkins Glen Festival start early on Friday September 11, and we need time to get there
- Tour start. It was decided early in the planning stages to start the tour at the Buffalo Transportation Pierce Arrow Museum rather than have people drive from wherever they live to a place in the GTA and leave from there. It saves time, driving on congested roads and gets people thinking about what cars and driving was like in the good old days. Since we all have to go through the border crossing, it's easier to have this behind us before we start. It also provides the opportunity to adjust your time to start the tour by either opting in or out of the Pierce Arrow Museum tour and lunch at Chef's.
- Being there. Some of us will arrive on Wednesday September 9 to ensure that we arrive at the start of our trip's the optional guided tour of the Buffalo Transportation Museum, To do this we can take advantage of the hospitality of the:

This hotel, researched by Arthur Donin, has free underground parking and is conveniently located about 7 minutes north of the Museum and is an easy drive from the Fort Erie bridge. The room price when I booked was \$112.

The following is the first day's itinerary, just to let you know what's in store

• Park your Miata in the Buffalo Pierce Arrow Transportation Museum parking lot before 1:30 PM. This is where the adventure begins.

- 10:00 Guided tour of the Buffalo Pierce Arrow Transportation Museum by the museum's proprietor, Jim Sandoro. The tour includes the Frank Lloyd Wright gasoline station, slated for construction in Buffalo in the early '30s, but never built because it was too expensive; \$1,200. Now a full sized replica has been constructed in this museum which is soon to be the largest museum (in square feet of display area) of its kind in the world. Participation in this is voluntary and cost \$20.00 per person. Please let me know if you want to join us.
- 11:00. The museum opens for those that want to just walk around and look. Participation is voluntary.
   Cost is \$10.00 per person. To facilitate entry and save time, tickets for both the guided tour and the walk about will be purchased before the event. Just let me know if you're in
- 12:30 Meet for lunch at The Chef's Restaurant. The "French Connection" room has been reserved for the exclusive use of the Trillium Miata Club. A menu will be provided in your booklet.
- 13:30 Depart for the road trip to Watkins Glen. Large scale highly detailed maps will be provided as
  well as turn by turn directions with distances marked in Kilos and Miles. If you are not at the
  departure point by the start time, your booklet will get you there, or you could even use a GPS
  device. If you're not planning on joining the group at the Buffalo Transportation Museum, please let
  me know
- 15:00 Arrive at the MacDonalds restaurant near Danville's airport. This is a rest stop with all that that implies. It is also time to put away the first map and get out the second one.
- 15:30 Continue on to Watkins Glen. Follow the car in front of you or if you're on your own consult your map and turn by turn directions. Less travelled roads for the most part with scenery improving as we get closer to our destination.
- 17:00 Arrive at The Glen Motor Inn, Watkins Glen. Check in and have a rest, or whatever before your evening repast.
  - 19:00 Dine at the Glen Motor Inn's Montage Grill. A menu will be provided before departure.

The above is pretty well cast in concrete. What follows is what's in store for the second day, September 11, in Watkins Glen as far as I know at this time.

- Most of us are registered for the Tour de Marque. More on this later
- 9:00 For those not on the Tour de Marque, there's the re-enactment of the scrutineering or technical inspection at Smalley's Garage on Franklin Street. A map of Watkins Glen with all the important sites marked will be provided in the booklet.
- 10:00 Concours d'eligance in the parking lot across from the Court House (start finish line). The location will be marked on the map.
- The rest of the day? Just play it by ear; enjoy looking at cars. Further details will be provided. For most of us the whole day will be taken with the Tour de Marque
- 19:00 Make your way to Seneca Lodge where hundreds of car enthusiasts will enjoy the bar and dine
  in rustic surroundings. Although we could not make reservations for our part of 37 they can
  accommodate us. If we all arrive at about the same time, they might be able to push some tables
  together.
- 21:00 Or about that time, a spectacular fire works display at the entrance to the park is a great way to finish our first full day.

The following post by Casey Creaner was copied from www.googlegroup.com/stonebridgedrivers verbatim. It deals with only one of the events planned for Saturday. If you want to participate in this, register as directed by them but let me know.

The Grand Prix Festival is still working on nailing down some of the details for the "Menu" of things to do for the rest of the GPF Weekend.

Here is one that is not only nailed down, but is also securely bolted.

The Glen Region SCCA is putting on a special Autocross (Solo Event) at Watkins Glen International on Saturday September 12<sup>th</sup>.

This special Autocross will feature two distinctly different autocross courses. One course (that some may refer to as the "bunny slope") will be a very easy course that will be designed with the first timers in mind. The other course will be a very challenging course and the event chair and course designer for that event assures me that it will be a very interesting course. He has shared his design with me, but in an effort to not spoil the surprise, I am keeping it a secret. Let's just say that as soon as you see it, you will say, wow, what a great idea for an autocross course design.

If you are a veteran autocrosser, you will want to run on the regular course although the easy course will also be available to you. And if you are a newbie, you can also run on whichever course you want.

Here is how the whole thing will work. The event will be limited to 80 drivers. I say drivers instead of cars because you can have multiple drivers in the same car if you want. We like to share at Glen Region. The cars and drivers will be broken down into 3 or more Run Groups. (Maybe broken down isn't the greatest term for some of you British car folks.) Anyway, each Run Group will be assigned a time to run, a time to work, and a time to rest. Yes all drivers must work in some fashion, whether it is helping out in the timing and scoring van or out on course chasing cones that try to get away.

When your Run Group is running, you can get in line and take your runs on the regular course, or you can go run on the Easy Course. By the way, the regular more challenging course will have electronic timing and at the end of the day they will be awarding trophies and points and such. While the easy course will be a much more relaxed atmosphere with stop watch timing and no trophies or points awarded.

So when your run group is running you can take your place and run the regular course or go over and run the easy course. You can even run both courses as long as you only run the regular course when your run group is running and it is your turn in line.

When your Run Group is working, you must take you place and fulfill your work assignment.

When your Run Group is resting (free time) you can rest or you are welcome to go run on the Easy Course regardless of what you did when your Run Group was running. Lots of options for lots of quality seat time.

Bring your helmet if you have one and if you don't, they will have some loners on hand. You will want to put some more air in your tires and be able to empty your car of any possible flying objects.

On-Line Registration is mandatory for this event and space is limited to the first 80 drivers. The price is \$35 for SCCA members of any region and \$45 for non-members. No fee will be collected during your on-line registration process although I will warn you that the automated registration will keep asking for money, but it won't actually accept any money, so don't worry about that part.

At this special event you will not only get to keep up with the car ahead of you but you will get a chance to see if you can keep up with me.

Newsletter Issue 2 15.07.22

This is the second in a series of newsletters provided to keep you up to date and prepare you for this unique adventure. The Festival is still evolving so not everything that is planned is fully developed. I will pass information on as it becomes available. Some of the things I speak to may not come to fruition, and other things may occur that come as a complete surprise. At the time of writing there are 91 Mazdas registered for the Tour de Marque

There are really three aspects to this tour which are independent but effect each other:

1) The Trillium Miata Club

This is the trip to Watkins Glen which includes the Buffalo Transportation Pierce Arrow Museum and lunch at Chef's Restaurant, both optional. It includes diner at the Montage Grill on Thursday evening on arrival at the Glen Motor Inn, and diner on Friday night at Seneca Lodge. All this is described in Issue 1 which you should already have. For those that want to participate in the guided tour of the museum, staying in Buffalo the evening prior to the tour start should be considered. The following is recommended.

2) The Watkins Glen Grand Prix Festival

Technical Inspection Re-enactment

For those not participating in the Tour de Marque, the re-enactment of technical inspection as it was originally done for racing cars beginning in 1948 by Flossie Smalley at Smalley's Garage will be continued. Same building, same family business.

There will be several cars on display, a tour of the garage displaying memorabilia and the organizers hope that Otto Linton, the last of the original race drivers will be there to reminisce about his time racing at the Glen and those that have passed. He will be there with his son Roger. They have great stories to tell.

So far the plans are for Denny will be bringing his father Denver Cornett's original 1947 MG, still with its original engine and still running well but not driven as hard any more. Vic Franzese (our host at the Glen Motor Inn) plans to bring his Aston Martin. Vic is famous for his beautiful gold and black MacLaren Can-Am car the he drives at the SVRA races. Also, Rick Hughey plans to bring his Formula Vee out. Rick has quite a Formula 1 history that he is willing to talk about.

It will start at 9:30 on Friday 15.09.11 and go basically till about 11:00 or whenever the crowd clears and the people involved get tired of talking cars with each other.

If you are involved in the Stone Bridge Drivers event, drop into Smalley's after you park your car. Check out what's in there. It's not a museum but there is a lot of vintage racing stuff to see. It's just a place with an incredible racing history in many forms of auto racing. A must see place for motor heads. They garage will be open for visitors to tour and talk to the Smalley family until 5:00 PM. They would like to close down and be out of there by 6:00 PM.

#### Concours d'Elegance

After the re-enactment at Smalley's, walk north about a block and cross the street to take in the cars on display. This eclectic display of antique, classics and sports cars is a judged event and has been something I've enjoyed. For example there's a mid '30s Marmon that the present owner rode in to the first Watkins Glen race in 1948. There are also exotics as well as the more common sports roadsters of the '60s.

#### The Wonderful Waterfall Tour

This is now ready for you to sign up <a href="http://www.grandprixfestival.com/waterfall.html">http://www.grandprixfestival.com/waterfall.html</a> One exciting change is that the Wonderful Waterfall Tour will not be discriminating based on the number of wheels on you vehicle. That means that even 2 wheeled and 3 wheeled vehicles can participate in this great event. (No 18 wheelers please.) Click on that link to see the details.

The Wonderful Waterfall Tour is part of the menu of events taking place during Grand Prix Festival of Watkins Glen Weekend. This new driving tour can be taken at your own pace and will introduce you to a number of Finger Lakes Waterfalls – some of which most people never see! The Two- or Three-Wheel Wonderful Waterfall Tour will take motorcycles and three-wheelers on a similar tour; starting Point will be announced.

The auto tour begins at Watkins Glen State Park's South Entrance [GPS co-ordinates: Latitude 42.375896, Longitude -76.871078], across from Seneca Lodge on NYS Route 419 (road opposite Mr. Chicken off NYS Route 14, in the Village of Watkins Glen) – registration between 8:30 and 9:00 a.m. Saturday, September 12, 2015. This is where you will meet your fellow travellers, hear a little introduction to the event, and receive your driving route and *Park Access Pass*.

The drive will take you to four – count 'em – four – N. Y. State Parks to view a great selection of waterfalls and natural water "features". En route, you will stop at and/or view falls along the way. Driving time, with stops to check out easily accessed falls is about three (3) hours; if you choose to get out and walk in to some of the others, elapsed time is as long as you are enjoying yourselves. Of course, if you decide to skip a few, or cut your day short, you can always return - they aren't going anywhere!

While much of the tour takes place on relatively lightly travelled state and local (paved) roads, some of the hidden gems will take you into the City of Ithaca. Traffic there can be busy and confusing, but the directions will be as clear as possible, with as many tips as can be provided to help you navigate!

The route brings everyone back to another Watkins Glen State Park viewing location. There are many places to stop for lunch or a snack along the way; while the Festival organizers don't promote any in particular, some easily accessed possibilities will be noted and information provided at registration.

Preregistration is necessary; please <u>download and complete this registration form</u> and send, with \$25.00 per vehicle fee to: Watkins Glen Promotions, P. O. Box 332, Watkins Glen, NY 14891. Please provide e-mail contact, if available, in order to share updates with you as they develop.

This is the third in the series of newsletters provided to keep you up to date and prepare you for the Watkins Glen Vintage Festival Tour. I had hoped that all the events at the Festival would be tied down by now, but some things are still evolving. So what's new?

When I first spoke about the tour, I said we would use paper maps and printed step-by-step directions for the tour. Some of us may. Those that prefer to use a GPS device of some sort or another now have the option of doing so. Don Muir, a registered Glen adventurer, took it upon himself to develop two GPX files that follow the route laid out on paper. I tried them out on my Samsung Galaxy Tab 0.7 plus and they work. I have attached them to the e-mail along with this, and posted them to the web-site in case they're needed en-route. Thank you Don.

Most of the following is redundant because it was covered in the first two Newsletters. The main purpose of this is to get your commitment to attend the optional events; events that require tickets or a count for restaurant reservations, and to find out if you're staying at the Holiday Inn Buffalo-Downtown. This might be useful for getting together for dinner or something.

Again, I'm going over the three aspects to this tour which are independent but effect each other:

The tour is in two stages, each about an hour and a half long. The first takes us to Danville where we stop for a break; coffee or whatever. The second stage takes us to the Glen Motor Inn, our accommodation at Watkins Glen.

We gather for diner at the Montage Grill on Thursday evening on arrival at the Glen Motor Inn, and diner on Friday night we go to Seneca Lodge. A buffet salad, then sit down and order a great meal surrounded by hundreds of motor heads. There's a working nickelodeon that works, for only a nickel. A great bar, rustic facilities, good food and great service. That pretty much wraps it up for the Trillium Tour.

• 2) The Watkins Glen Grand Prix Festival. This is a summary of the most important events. Some happen at the same time, so you can't participate in everything. More detail on these events can be found in the first two issues of this newsletter.



#### **Wonderful Waterfall Tour**

# Parade of Lotus, Ferrari, 'Muscle cars' New Feature

WATKINS GLEN, N.Y. (Sept. 2, 2015) – The Grand Prix Festival of Watkins Glen presented by Chemung Canal Trust Company returns Friday, Sept. 11, to the home of American road racing.

Mazda is the featured marque, and more than 100 Mazdas will be joining the other 400 or so sports cars for this celebration of the history of racing in Watkins Glen.

This year's Grand Prix Festival extends through the weekend with several new activities.

The opportunity to increase the fun for both festival participants and observers was the result of changes to the Sportscar Vintage Racing Association's 2015 schedule. Due to the re-paving project at Watkins Glen International, SVRA was at the track in July, rather than its traditional September date.

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This is from Casey at the Glen and is addressed to those who will be driving the old course, which is most of us.

Old Course Rookies, please read it carefully.

# Rules for Laps of the Old Course for all Stone Bridge Drivers, including Grand Autocade drivers:

During your 2 lap tour of the Old Course it is an open road, **not a closed course.** There will be oncoming traffic and there may even be local traffic mixed in with your group if you wrongly let that happen.

Be aware that one third of you want to drive too fast, and wish the rest would speed up.

Another third of you want to drive too slowly, and are annoyed at how fast everyone else is going.

While the other third just wants to do it properly with everyone keeping it at a safe and proper speed.

My goal is to keep this festival going for as many years as possible. That means **NO MISHAPS** on the Old Course. It is better to have a little bit of fun for a lot of years than to have a lot of fun for only one year.

Although each Stone Bridge Driver Event will have its own lead car, there will be one common pace car that will pace each group for all of the Stone Bridge Driver Laps. This year the pace car will be a 2016 MX-5 Launch Edition owned and driven by Robyn Resch.

As in the past Pat Scopelliti will be driving his 308 Ferrari as the last car in each group.

Each group will be split into two lanes as they enter Franklin Street on their approach to the S/F line for the start of their two laps. The person who does the splitting is a pro and is used to splitting real race cars driven by pros, so act accordingly. Meaning look for his signals and do what he tells you, and try not to hit him. He is trained to not move, so you only have one spot to avoid.

Each group will get a standing start and then be un-split, back into one lane as they approach turn one at the beginning of their two laps. **This will happen one lane at a time.** In other words one lane will proceed and then the other will follow. This will all be at the direction of our traffic people. So, all you have to do is **pay attention** and go when and where they tell you to go. If the one car in the moving lane is slow on the uptake, the next car in the waiting lane will be directed to go, to try to keep you all together.

There will be no passing at all while doing your two laps on the Old Course. Sorry, but we really have to keep it safe for the longevity of this great event.

Keep in mind that when we do our laps, the Old Course is still an open road. It is NOT a closed course.

There will be no breaking of any speed limits while doing your two laps on the Old Course. There will be Police cars patrolling the course in the opposite direction who will be issuing traffic tickets to any violators.

Standard NY seat belt laws will still be in effect and will be enforced. And the driver and every passenger in your car must have signed a waiver when they showed up at their respective events. That means no added passengers for your two lap tour. And if I catch any driver texting or talking on a cell phone while driving, you will instantly be thrown out.

While speeding is prohibited, **driving too slow will also not be tolerated**. If you and/or your car are not capable of maintaining 55 MPH outside of the village limits, we ask that you agree to not participate in your respective two lap tour of the Old Course. Please tell your event chair at your drivers meeting that you won't be able to keep up and you will be told where to go and what to do so that you will still be able to park with your group.

Anyone who is taking part in the two lap tour, who fails to keep up with the group, will be pulled out of their group on Franklin Street by one of the traffic workers and asked to remain there while the rest of their group completes their laps. I know this sounds harsh, but I have to tell you that not keeping up with the car ahead of you can be as dangerous and/or disruptive as driving too fast.

It will be up to each and every Stone Bridge Driver to **KEEP UP** with the car in front of you. You will not be required to break any speed limits or drive in a dangerous manner to accomplish this task of keeping up. But it will only work if everyone does their part. If one car lags behind, they hold up the train behind them, and then they have to go too fast to catch up, and then we have huge holes in the group, which in turn encourages pedestrians to cross the street, which can of course put them and our entire festival in jeopardy. Also even relatively small gaps will unnecessarily allow local cars and trucks to get into the mix which will then make it impossible for you to keep up without dangerously speeding. When I see the gap on Franklin Street and you tell me there had been a big truck who got into the line, I automatically know you were not keeping up properly. That is the only way that truck could have gotten in front of you.

And slowing down so that you can soon speed up to get a good run on an interesting part of the course will also not be tolerated because it then puts the person behind you in a position where they either speed to keep up with you or maintain normal speed and create a gap that makes them look like the culprit when I see a big gap in town and pull them out. And as much as I like music, there is no room on the Old Course for the accordion effect.

You all know the old joke: Why did the pedestrian cross the road? No it really wasn't to get to the other side. It was because **one of you failed to keep up** with the car ahead of you and now we have a bunch of pedestrians in the way. Shame on you!

Not keeping up with the car ahead of you not only encourages stupid pedestrians to put themselves into harm's way, but it will also allow cars, trucks, and dreaded RVs out on the course to get into your line and in the way of everyone. The best way to keep them out is to **keep up with the car ahead of you.** This will also make it impossible for the interlopers who try every year to get into the act.

Have you ever driven in a funeral procession in a big city? They all know full well how to keep up with the car ahead or else get stuck at a light.

We have a lot of Stone Bridge Driver vehicles to put across the Old Course in a very small amount of time. That creates a very tight schedule that only works when you are doing your part by following directions and keeping up with the car ahead of you.

Another thing to consider is that while you are enjoying your 2 laps of the Old Course, you are also "The Show" downtown for many, many spectators. Well, it isn't much of a show if there are big gaps between groups of cars. That leaves you just one choice:

# Keep up with the car ahead of you.

**Please help the festival by doing your part to obey these rules**. You will still have a fun drive and you will find that it will be so much more enjoyable for everyone when you are all going at approximately the same speed.

There will be some official photographers on the Old Course taking your pictures. When you see them, feel free to wave and smile, **but do not in any way slow down to sort of pose for the cameras.** If you do, and it gets reported to me, you can expect to be pulled out and/or banned from future Stone Bridge Driver events.

I know it all sounds harsh and restrictive at times, but in reality if everyone just keeps up without any shenanigans, all of the Stone Bridge Drivers, all of our festival volunteers, and all of the spectators will have a great time.

It's all about having fun with cars.
